Law Department

The Law Department is a team of 300+ attorneys and professional staff supporting City operations through legal representation, tax and code enforcement, compliance monitoring, contracts, legislation, and litigation. As counsel to the Mayor's Office, operating departments, City Council, and City Boards and Commissions, our team is working behind-the-scenes to promote a safer, cleaner, greener Philadelphia with economic opportunity for all.

We are thrilled to expand our practice in the New Year with the recent creation of our Compliance Unit. The Unit counsels and represents City departments on issues involving compliance with federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and best practices to City departments and officials with a focus on children and family welfare, public safety, and accessibility in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Specifically, this team is working on:

- Creating a reasonable accommodation policy for HR teams across the City, so that employees and applicants with disabilities receive appropriate accommodations for their disabilities;
- Supporting the Office of Homeless Services in improving accessibility of services, by advising the development of a reasonable accommodation step in the intake process and an appeal system, and hiring a contractor to survey all OHS facilities for accessibility;
- Counseling the Police Department, the Department of Prisons, and the Department of Human Services on initiatives to enhance safety protocols for staff and individuals in custody in compliance with civil rights laws.



As we look ahead to 2025, we are eager to continue supporting our City clients in their work to provide critical services and promote improved quality of life for Philadelphians. We are just a phone call or an email away, and are always happy to offer our legal expertise.

Philadelphia Water Department

At the Philadelphia Water Department (PWD), our dedicated team works tirelessly to ensure that every Philadelphian has access to safe, high-quality drinking water. Supporting our community goes beyond maintaining our vast network of over 3,100 miles of water mains, 3,700 miles of sewers, six treatment facilities, and 34 pumping stations. It's about delivering services with fairness, equity, and a focus on public involvement.

We're excited to spotlight our employees and their contributions to our new **Lead Plumbing and Water Quality Initiatives**. These initiatives represent the latest in our longstanding efforts to safeguard public health while complying with federal mandates.



Key projects include:

- **Lead Testing in Schools and Childcare Facilities:** Offering lead plumbing assessments to protect our youngest residents.
- **Service Line Material Mapping:** Sharing an interactive map with PWD's service line records to increase transparency.
- **Citywide Notifications:** Keeping residents informed about their service line materials and potential updates.

That's why we launched the **Philly Stat 360 website**—a real-time hub for tracking City services and ensuring transparency. While you may already be familiar with high-profile statistics like the homicide rate or trash collection performance, Philly Stat 360 sheds light on the equally important, behind-the-scenes work that keeps our city running.

Here's what makes our platform stand out:

- ✓ **Five Clear Categories** – City services are grouped into Safer, Cleaner, Greener, Economic Opportunity, and Core Services, making it easy to navigate.
- ✓ **Color-Coded Performance Measures** – Instantly see whether we're meeting our goals.
- ✓ **Deep Dives on Key Metrics** – Click on any measure to learn why it matters, how we track it, and what's being done to improve it.

But Philly Stat 360 is more than just a website—it's a new approach to data-driven government. Since launching in Spring 2024, our team has been working with City departments to use data for smarter decision-making, set clear goals, improve performance, and increase public trust in City services.

Office of Innovation and Technology

The Office of Innovation and Technology (OIT) has announced the launch of their **Philly Free Wi-Fi Finder**. The service allows Philadelphians to locate free and reliable Wi-Fi at over 180 sites around the city. Users can search by zip code or specific location to find nearby Wi-Fi access, helping Philadelphians stay connected to vital digital services.

This project is the latest in the City's efforts to achieve digital equity, ensuring that all Philadelphia residents have the tools to succeed in an increasingly online world. It reflects the mission of DigitalEquityPHL, a team dedicated to the goal of access to internet, affordable devices, and technological competency for all Philadelphians.

Home Wi-Fi is not affordable for every resident of Philadelphia, and public Wi-Fi is not always reliable. By simplifying the process of locating free and reliable internet near the home, OIT provides an essential service that directly affects Philadelphia's social and economic future.

Find free City Wi-Fi

The City offers free Wi-Fi at many recreation centers, older adult centers, parks, and libraries. Over 180 locations are part of a [franchise agreement between the City and Verizon](#) to install high-speed broadband and public Wi-Fi for residents over two years.

To find a free Wi-Fi location:

- Search an address or ZIP code to find locations near you.

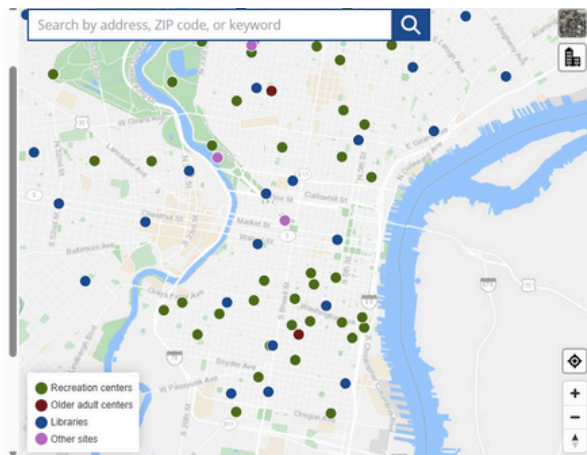

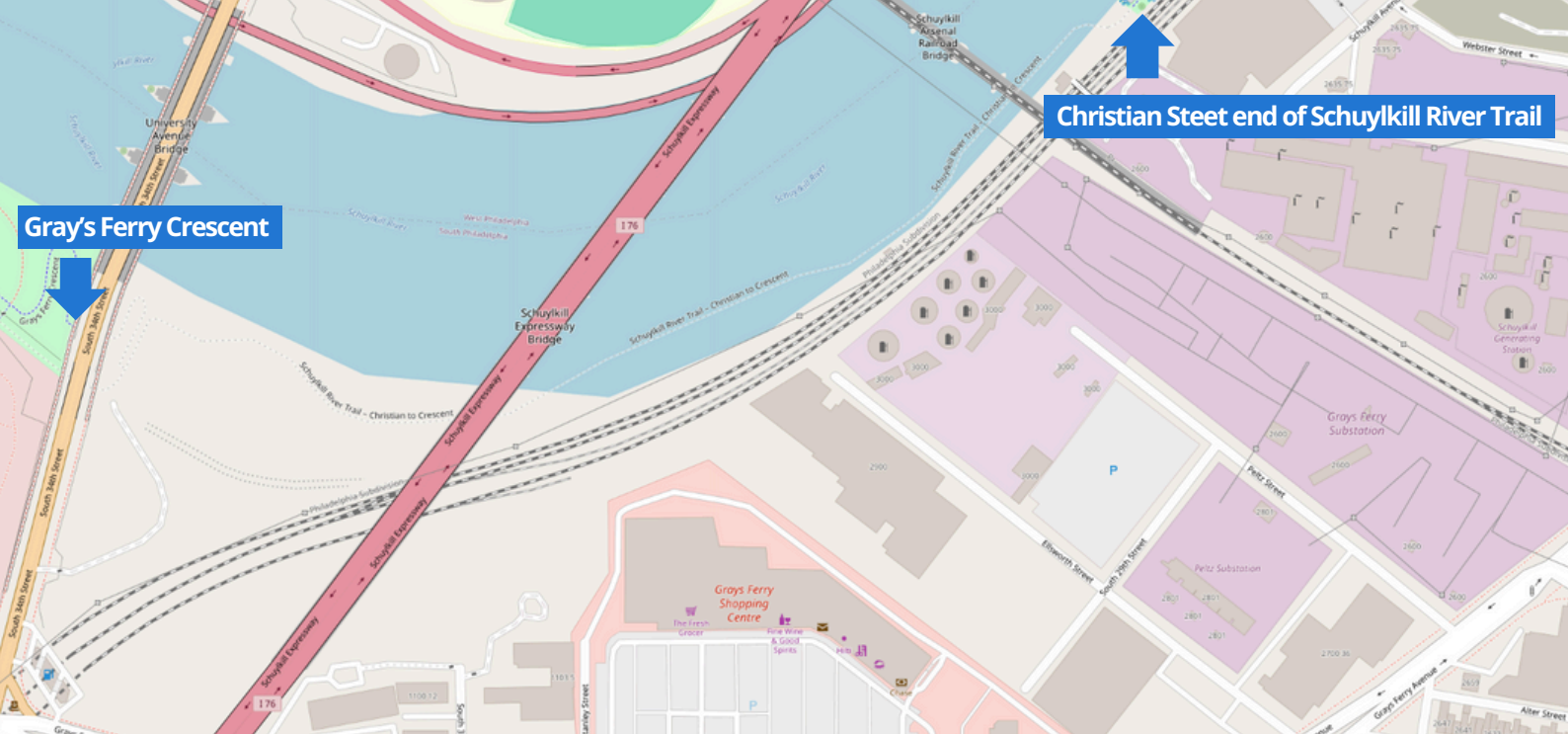

Christian Steet end of Schuylkill River Trail

Gray's Ferry Crescent

Who is working successphilly?

Department of Streets

On May 17, the Department of Streets celebrated the opening day of the Christian to Crescent section of the Schuylkill River Trail. This extension connects what was the end of the Schuylkill River Trail on Christian Street to the Gray's Ferry Crescent Trail and Park to the south.

The new trail section, on the river's east side, adds 2,812 feet to Schuylkill Banks and features a 650 foot bridge that offers scenic river views and lighting for nighttime safety. It also includes a tunnel to Grays Ferry Crescent and a link to the 34th Street Bridge.

The completion of the Christian to Crescent section of the Schuylkill River Trail marks a major step toward a greener and better connected Philadelphia. By closing a critical gap in the trail and offering a safe, car-free route for pedestrians and cyclists, this project encourages sustainable transportation and reduces reliance on vehicles.



With its thoughtful design and accessible features, the new trail segment not only enhances connectivity but also promotes a healthier, more environmentally friendly city for all.

Creative Philadelphia

The Creative Philadelphia Art Gallery has officially reopened its doors following renovations—and it's more than just a fresh coat of paint. Located in Room 116 of City Hall, the gallery is once again welcoming the public to explore artwork by local Philadelphia artists, especially those who may not otherwise have access to a public space to showcase their work.

The reopening also marks the 15th anniversary of the gallery's original debut in 2010. With updated flooring, added storage, and improved exhibition and office spaces, the Creative Philadelphia team is ready to continue its mission of elevating creativity throughout the city.

The gallery is a hidden gem in the heart of City Hall, open Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Fridays from 12 to 4 p.m. It's the perfect place for City employees to take a lunch break, enjoy some creative inspiration, or stop in to meet the Creative Philadelphia team. Visitors should enter through the Northeast Corner Visitor's Entrance.

The first exhibition in the renovated space, *Made and Remade – the Art of the Philadelphia Dumpster Divers*, featured 15 artists who transform everyday discarded objects into imaginative works of art. City employees were invited to visit the new space and experienced the exhibit at the Gallery Open House on June 4.

Philadelphia Department of Prisons

On July 9, the Philadelphia Department of Prisons (PDP) hosted a graduation ceremony for the 67 cadets of Class 25-02—PDP’s largest cadet class in more than ten years. The event, which featured Mayor Parker as keynote speaker, was a celebration of the cadets’ significant achievement and PDP’s continued success in strengthening its correctional workforce.

Correctional officers play a vital role in maintaining safety and supporting positive outcomes for incarcerated individuals. Recognizing the importance of this work, PDP has made consistent effort to attract qualified candidates and provide recruits with optimal training and support. Recent initiatives include opening a new training academy, the Academy of Correctional Excellence (ACE), a larger facility equipped with updated technology and resources to better prepare officers for their position. PDP has also hired a dedicated recruitment coordinator and recruitment firm to ensure that the best candidates are chosen to grow its ranks.

PDP understands that a correctional officer’s mental and physical wellbeing impacts their ability to work effectively. This year, the Department opened a new Wellness Center equipped with state-of-the-art fitness equipment and hired a wellness coordinator to design and oversee plans for correctional staff wellbeing. Additionally, PDP introduced a mentorship program to help new staff acclimate to their role—providing new officers with the support they need to succeed in the Department.

The recent graduation ceremony also recognized Assistant Deputy Commissioners Anthony Degner (Special Operations), Mary Archer (Reentry), and Dr. Stephanie N. Baker (Programs/Education) as they took the Oath of Office. PDP continues its mission to build a more humane and effective correctional system, and this staffing milestone serves as a testament to their dedication. Congratulations to the members of Class 25-02 on this achievement, and thank you to the Philadelphia Department of Prisons for your unwavering commitment to improving the correctional environment and supporting public safety.

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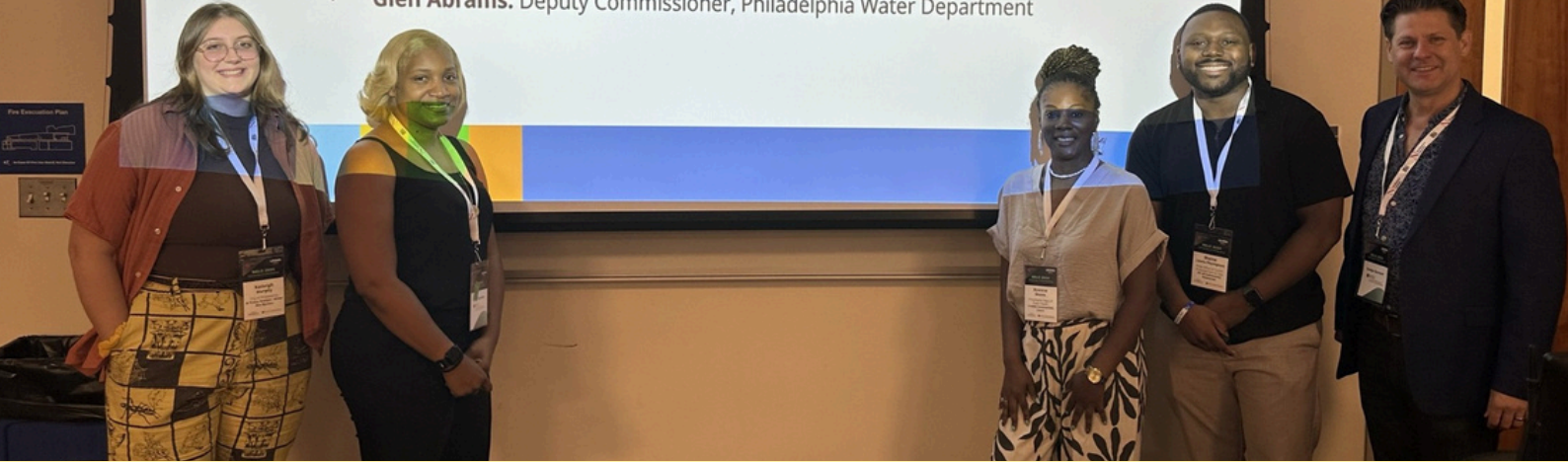

Managing Director's Office Health and Human Services

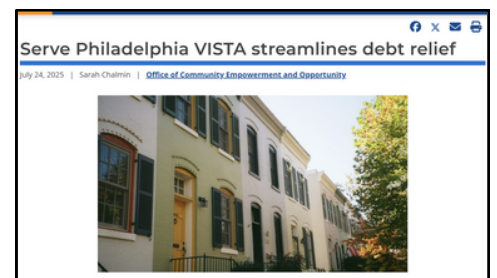
The Managing Director's Office Health and Human Services (MDO HHS) team is making a meaningful difference in the lives of residents by addressing a critical barrier to financial stability: unpaid debt. Through two innovative programs, MDO HHS is working to ensure Philadelphians can stay in their homes and have access to equal opportunity and long-term security.

The first initiative, the Water Shutoff Prevention Program, a partnership with the Water Revenue Bureau and the Office of Community Empowerment and Opportunity (CEO), intervenes early to stop service disconnections before they happen. By identifying at-risk households and connecting them with needed resources, this program helps families maintain access to essential utilities while avoiding a cycle of debt that can lead to housing loss and water insecurity.

The second program is a pilot, also supported by CEO and the Office of Public Safety, that tackles criminal justice-related debt. Through the Criminal and Juvenile Justice Debt Relief Program, the City identifies individuals eligible for debt forgiveness based on factors like income and court history. By removing the financial burdens that can prevent people from paying restitution to victims of crime, gaining employment, or disentangling from the criminal justice system, this effort promotes economic equity and public safety.

Both programs reflect MDO HHS's deep commitment to building a healthier, more stable Philadelphia. They demonstrate how strategic coordination, data-driven outreach, and compassion can combine to address root causes of housing instability, water insecurity, and financial hardship.

Together, these programs are not just preventing crisis—they are creating opportunity. MDO HHS continues to lead with innovation, care, and a clear vision for a more just and resilient city.

Office of Sustainability

This summer, Philadelphia has felt the impacts of climate change, with heavier rainfall and hotter-than-average temperatures. It is more important than ever for residents to understand how the City is preparing for the future. The Office of Sustainability (OOS) is leading the charge—tackling the challenges of a changing climate, advancing environmental justice, and working to reduce carbon emissions. Keep reading to learn about recent OOS initiatives creating a more sustainable Philadelphia.

Climate Resilience

The Climate Resilience Division of OOS works to anticipate and address climate risks, safeguarding Philadelphia residents and strengthening the city's ability to adapt, recover, and thrive in the face of a changing environment.

The Climate Resilience Division is updating Philadelphia's Climate Resilience Plan with a focus on equity, ensuring residents and community groups have a voice in shaping decisions. Input is being collected through the [Citywide Climate Resilience Public Survey](#), and community-based organizations are invited to participate as [Climate Resilience partners](#). Eastwick: From Recovery to Resilience: an initiative to confront the neighborhood's unique challenges—chronic flooding, environmental hazards, and quality of life threats—by working alongside residents to restore, protect, and strengthen this historic Southwest Philadelphia community.

Strawberry Mansion Heat Resilience Initiative: a community-driven effort to tackle the neighborhood's extreme heat challenges—rooted in limited shade, aging infrastructure, and scarce cooling options—by partnering with residents to create long-term strategies that keep the area cooler, safer, and more resilient in a warming climate.

Flood Management Program: unites multiple City departments to develop science-based, equitable strategies that protect communities, guide smart land use, and advance climate adaptation through coordinated flood risk reduction efforts. The Climate Resilience Division leads the Flood Resilience and Compliance Program within Philadelphia's Flood Management Program

Energy and Climate Solutions

The Division of Energy and Climate Solutions (DECS) advances Philadelphia's climate and energy objectives by guiding City government in energy efficiency and sustainable practices, while supporting citywide climate action, promoting environmental justice, and strengthening resilience, as detailed in the [2025 Philadelphia Climate Action Update](#). Read about some of the recent DCES initiatives that are contributing to a more energy efficient Philly.

Adams Solar Project: a major milestone for Philadelphia supplying 150,000 megawatt-hours of locally-produced solar electricity at a low, fixed rate, moving the City closer to its goal of 100% renewable municipal operations by 2030.

Philadelphia Streetlight Improvement Project: a three-year, citywide initiative converting 130,000 streetlights to energy-efficient LEDs linked to a new lighting management system—improving visibility, speeding maintenance, and reducing municipal carbon emissions more than any other City energy efficiency project.

Energy Poverty Alleviation Strategy: a guide for the City to achieve a fair and equitable shift to clean energy while addressing increasing energy costs.

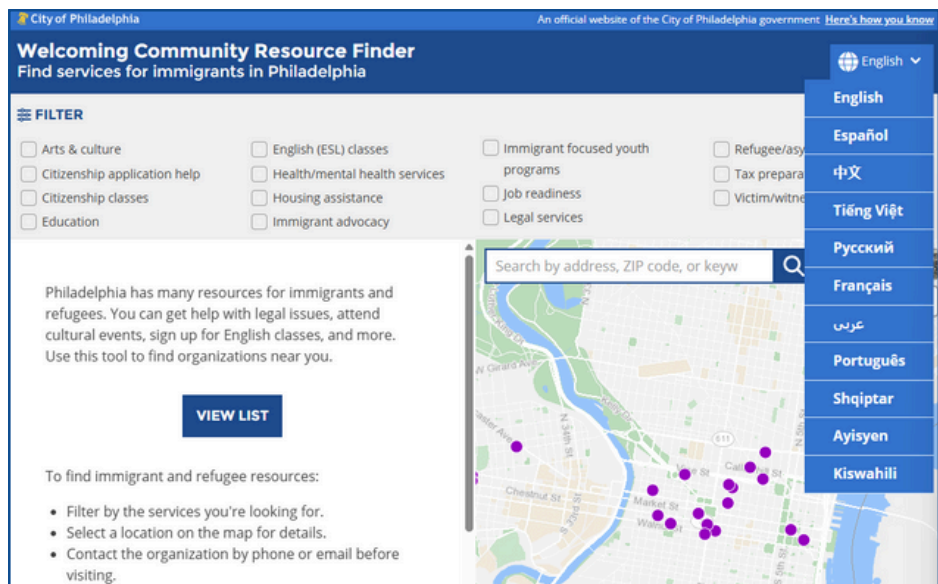
Office of Immigrant Affairs

On September 24, the Welcoming Network hosted an event to celebrate the launch of the **Welcoming Community Resource Finder**—a groundbreaking online tool connecting immigrants, refugees, and asylum-seekers to the resources they need to flourish in Philadelphia.

For the thousands of newcomers who arrive in Philadelphia every year, gaining access to vital services can be an unnecessarily complicated struggle. The decentralization of relevant information and resources makes it harder for newcomers to know where to go for help. The Resource Finder was developed to address this issue. It serves as a multilingual online hub where individuals can quickly locate the support they need, allowing users to filter for topics such as housing, healthcare, education, and employment assistance. With information available in 10 languages, the platform is designed to meet people where they are.

The initiative is a product of the **Philadelphia Welcoming Network**, a coalition of public and private partners working together to build a more coordinated and inclusive system for newcomers. Central to this work is the **Office of Immigrant Affairs** (OIA), whose leadership ensures that communication and collaboration across the network remain strong. OIA's dedication to immigrant communities has been vital in shaping a city where everyone belongs.

The Resource Finder is more than just a directory—it's a step toward a more connected and accessible city. Philadelphia's commitment is clear: regardless of birthplace or background, all who arrive here are valued. With this launch, the City reaffirms the right for newcomers to build their lives and thrive in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia Fire Department

The Philadelphia Fire Department recently honored its Firefighter & EMS Providers of the Year for their exceptional skills and courage under pressure.

Firefighter Matthew McCrory was recognized for rescuing two unconscious people from separate house fires in West Philly. Paramedic Zachary Weinstein and Firefighter/EMT Mitchell Valentin were recognized for rescuing a shooting victim during ongoing gunfire. Their bravery allowed them to provide skilled care while transporting the patient to the hospital.

Mayor's Office of Policy Planning and Delivery

The Mayor's Office of Policy Planning and Delivery (OPPD) completed the What Works Cities certification assessment in 2025. This certification helps the City measure its progress using data and evidence for decision-making. It also provides City workers with access to educational resources and a community of peer cities.

Department of Behavioral Health and Intellectual disAbility Services (DBHIDS)

The Department of Behavioral Health and Intellectual disAbility Services (DBHIDS) worked with the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) and several community organizations to organize the Lester Ross Memorial burial ceremony to honor the lives of those who were homeless and formerly homeless who have passed away and whose cremains went unclaimed.

This burial service was born from representatives from SELF (Strengthening and Empowering Lives and Futures), Inc. and ODAAT (One Day at a Time) Recovery Services who knew Lester Ross, a well-known man in the homeless community with an infectious smile. When Lester passed, it was discovered that his cremains went unclaimed, along with the cremains of many others in the homeless community.

DBHIDS was among those organizations who understood that everyone should be buried with dignity and collaborated to ensure that those who passed would be acknowledged and have a dignified ceremony. The program included remarks, an interfaith benediction and song, and a reading of the names of the deceased.

The Office of Community Empowerment and Opportunity (CEO) is pleased to introduce the **Community Resource Connectors (CRC)** program. Formerly known as Community Resource Corps, CRC partners with City departments to support outreach and application processes.

Community Resource Connectors meet residents where they are by bringing their lived experience in Philadelphia neighborhoods and training in trauma-informed community engagement to offer support with navigating City resources. Connectors currently support residents with applications for PWD and Revenue programs, and are looking for additional partnerships within City government and beyond.

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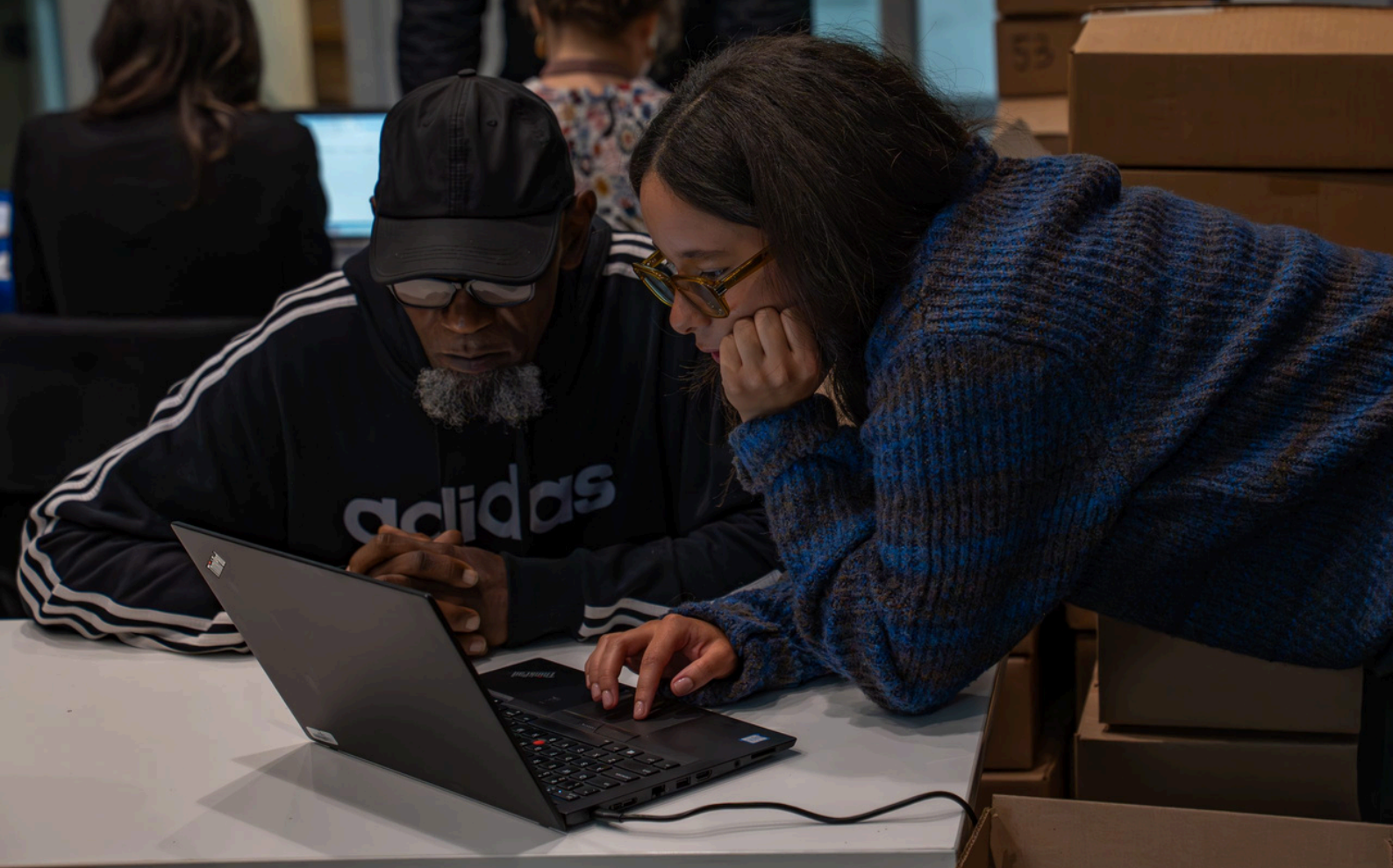
